Since the 2015-16 academic year, the University of New Orleans has pursued strategic initiatives focused on improving student retention, activity which in its scope is unprecedented on our campus. After a Fall 2015 faculty/ staff retreat, where we analyzed the relevant data and discussed potential strategies, we formed the action teams that currently pursue 12 individual retention initiatives. Recently, a new action team has been formed, whose objective is maximizing support for our at-risk student population. Finally, the faculty who teach Freshman English and Math have redoubled their efforts to improve student success rates in the courses that are crucial for student persistence.

Personalized Teaching Strategies for Successful Student Transition from Academia to Professional Life

There are three points in this presentation – although focused on non-traditional student populations, these points apply equally to all students and all majors: (1) The need to develop Critical Thinking, Writing and Reading Skills – development of the rational faculty with the goal of transitioning from (academic) memorization to (real world) understanding and application; (2) The importance of using a Variety of Teaching Strategies in the classroom – not only do adults learn differently than children but they learn differently from each other; and (3) The (often under-emphasized) benefits of individual interaction with students during Office Hours – these visits break barriers for most non-traditional students, motivate them to participate in class and prepare them for interaction in their chosen careers.

Prevalence of Serial Inventors within Academia

Dr. Richard Kordal | Louisiana Tech University

Much has been written about serial entrepreneurs, those innovative individuals who continuously come up with fresh ideas to start new businesses. Often, these business ideas and new products are based on technology invented by others. Similarly, within the research community, there are scientists and engineers who are particularly inventive and produce patents at a high level or are serial inventors. Though they are key players in the innovation process, less is known about these individuals. It was the aim of this study to determine how prevalent these individuals are among all university faculty inventors. A detailed study of the inventors listed on all the US patents issued to five major research universities over a 23-year period highlights the out-sized contributions of serial inventors. Particularly striking is how similar these contributions were among the five universities studied.

Increasing the STEM Teacher Pipeline

Glenn Larson and Chris Campbell Louisiana Tech University

UTeachTech is a relatively new program at Louisiana Tech University, but has already shown the potential for a significant increase in the number of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) teachers graduating from this university. In the first 3 years, we have already enrolled 350 students in the introductory course work. The program was originally expected to produce it's first graduates in the Spring of 2019, but has five (5) future Math teachers on course to graduate in 2018. Given that only one of the five originally came to the University intending to be a teacher, there is some promising evidence that the UTeach concept can effectively increase the STEM teacher pipeline.

Re-Inventing and Expanding a **Successful Professional Development Program for Business and Industry**

In 1990, the College of Engineering and Computer Science at McNeese State University proposed a professional development program for local registered professional engineers. Industry welcomed the idea and the Lake Area Industry/McNeese Engineering Partnership (LAI/MEP) was born. LAI/MEP focused its efforts in providing registered professional engineers in the area with 4 to 6 courses per year ensuring that registered engineers in all disciplines had an opportunity to earn the professional development hours needed in order to maintain their engineering registration. LAI/MEP has been operating successfully by the College of Engineering and Computer Science since then at no additional cost to the Board. Since its inception, IIEC has brought Southwest Louisiana more than 130 courses, and has saved local industry millions of dollars in training costs.

In 2017 Davis and Nicholas from John Hopkins published an article called Having Just One Black Teacher Can Keep Black Kids in School. The Digest of Education Statistics indicates that 2% of the American teachers are African American males. When Louisiana Tech was confronted with this information, we strategically put into action a plan to address it. This plan included the Call Me Mister program which involves the recruiting and retention of African American Males into the Elementary and Middle schools in Louisiana. This program is in its infancy phase and has had some successes as well as its challenges. We are proud to be the first university in the state of Louisiana to have the Call Me Mister program. Impact of Active Learning Environment in Freshman Mathematics courses on Students' Success and Persistence

Lisa Crespo | *University of New Orleans*

Student performance in UNO's Math 1115 (Applied Algebra) course had been lacking. Drop rates were high and the number of students, passing with a grade of C or better, had been unimpressive. As a result, the Mathematics faculty at UNO instituted an enhanced student active learning environment that increased student engagement in the classroom and improved productivity. The implementation of an active learning environment in freshman mathematics courses has resulted in over 15% improvement in student success and over 100% decrease in the withdrawal rate. The active learning environment has also impacted the student persistence rate significantly.

Acknowledging the importance of reinvestment in university education toward empowering the state's citizens and growing its economy, the University of Louisiana System as the largest post-secondary system in Louisiana has established a strategic framework that aspires to increase (1) participation and success among all populations and (2) the number of career-ready graduates by 20% in eight years.

Community Partnership to Enhance Mental Health Care

Connie Hale | Northwestern State University

Nationally, 1 in 5 adults experience mental illness. The economic burden of mental illness is estimated to outweigh the costs of chronic conditions such as diabetes and cancer. Serious mental illness results in \$193.2 billion annually in lost earnings. Disability, social welfare, homelessness, accidents, and crime also contribute to costs related to mental illness. Louisiana has very low access to mental health care. In January 2017, the Health Recourses and Services Administration, Bureau of Health Workforce, reported Louisiana had 118 Mental Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSA's), and indicated only 40.61% of Louisiana citizens' mental health needs are met. NSU partnered with The Rapides Foundation to enhance mental healthcare access, delivery, and workforce development within our mutual service sectors of Louisiana.

Formation of a Statewide University Research Network in Disaster Response and Recovery

This session proposes to establish a collaborative network of researchers, scientists, engineers, and scholars among Louisiana Universities as a standing resource for state disaster response and recovery. The program will identify faculty within the University System to develop a program of scientific research and analysis, teaching and workforce development, public/private partnerships, and public outreach and education to improve the economic and societal resilience of Louisiana and its communities, and protect the national critical infrastructure systems within the state. The presentation will include a history of disasters in Louisiana, and discuss research priorities identified by the Governor's Louisiana Recovery Task Force from the 2016 statewide flood recovery.

As our enrollment continues to rise, we recognize our responsibility in educating Louisiana's future biologists for their roles in wildlife and fisheries, healthcare, environmental protection and education. To that end, we have adopted a national AAAS/PULSE model to align our curriculum to recommended core concepts and competencies, expanded academic support via a large, volunteer peer mentor network, expanded access to biology work through internships with local, state and national labs and agencies, and have begun integrating authentic research experiences into all levels of our four-year curriculum.

Pushing Students to New Academic Heights Using Active-Learning in a Fluid Classroom

In today's world, students need more than knowledge to be competitive for professional/graduate school or the workforce. Critical thinking, knowledge application, teamwork, and oral communication skills are valuable commodities and teaching them to students using traditional approaches is difficult. We will discuss our experience in the teaching transition to an active learning environment that allows in-class time for pushing students to new academic heights. This dynamic learning space has facilitated paired, group, and applied student learning and has promoted peer-to-peer instruction and problem-based learning in the classroom. We will address technologies included in classroom design, examples of classroom activities, and tips for implementing active learning.

Assessing Safety Culture in the Manufacturing Arena: A Structured Equation Modeling Approach

Dr. Nabin Sapkota and Dr. Macia Hardy Northwestern State University

Safety is directly related to productivity while productivity directly impacts market competitiveness, costs, and response time. These factors are essential to the survival of a business. This session presents recent international manufacturing safety measure discoveries and a proposed Louisiana manufacturing industry collaboration. Structured equation modeling is employed within the research design. This statistical measurement model analyzes and measures the strength of the relationship between measured variables and unobserved variables responsible for safety culture in the industry. This case study explores safety culture variables using collected survey data and analysis to understand indirect safety measures impacting the manufacturing work environment.

Expanding the Research Capacity at Grambling State University through the establishment of Partnerships
