Item I.1. McNeese State University's request for approval for a referendum to allow changes to the allocation of student resources, with the purpose of better serving the student body and the McNeese family.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On December 3, 2020, the Student Government Association Senate passed a resolution proposing a referendum for a student vote for the following. The referendum will have three functions:

- 1. To establish the creation of the *Senator Expectations Program* to codify a structured system for establishing senator involvement;
- 2. To change how student resources are allocated so this program can be funded;
- 3. To create the SGA Senate Project Fund to allow senators to establish a substantial student-led campus project.

The following tables show the fee shifts allowing for the creation of the *Senator Expectations Program* and *SGA Senate Project Fund*.

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Full-time students attending <u>Fall, Spring and Summer</u> semesters <u>will save \$5.00</u>. Full-time students attending <u>Fall and Spring</u> semesters <u>will save \$2.00</u>. Part-time students attending <u>Fall, Spring and Summer</u> semester costs <u>will not change</u>. Part-time students attending Fall and Spring semesters costs will increase by \$3.00.

Based on the current enrollment projections, the net savings on the entire student body will be the sum of \$13,000.

This proposal does not increase student fees overall. It restructures fees to create an opportunity to meet other needs of the McNeese student body. Within the restructuring, the following fees are being increased for the following:

SGA: This fee is being increased to develop a Senator Expectations Program within SGA. This program will increase the accountability of student senators and provide incentives to student leaders who have earned higher recognition. Additionally, the increase in revenue will allow SGA to better serve McNeese students through programming and advocacy initiatives.

Organization Fund: The Organizations Fund is the only financial resource accessible to most student organizations who do not have a stable revenue source. Each of the past three academic years, the fund has been completely dissolved due to extensive need. A greater beginning balance each academic year will allow for more student organizations be served.

SGA Senate Project Fund: The creation of the SGA Senate Project will give senators a direct avenue for change within Student Government. This project fund will be utilized by the senate for student-lead development and to encourage widespread student involvement. This will encourage engagement with the student body and develop leadership skills for SGA Senators

8. INDICATE WHAT YOUR CURRENT FULL TIME MANDATORY ATTENDANCE FEES ARE AND WHAT THEY WILL BE IF THIS FEE IS APPROVED.

Current mandates fee totals for a full-time student taking 12 hours are:

McNeese State University Student Government Association Senator Expectations Program and SGA Senate Project

WHEREAS The McNeese State Student Government strives to promote Senator engagement on campus. The Student Government Association is tasked with ensuring an efficient allocation of student resources, for the purpose of better serving the student body and the McNeese family.

WHEREAS this proposal has three functions. First, to establish the creation of the Senator Expectations

Program to codify a structured system for establishing senator involvement. Second, is a change in how
student resources are allocated to fund this program. Thirdly, will be the creation of the SGA Senate

Project fund. Whose purpose is to allow senators to establish a substantial student lead campus project.

WHEREAS this SGA Senate fund is to be administrated by the Campus Development Committee in consultation with the SGA advisor and the Director of Facilities. To ensure proper and ethical use of the monles.

WHEREAS The SGA Senate project fund if enacted will not be allocated, until a proper fund structure and constitution has been approved by both the SGA senate and proper university authorities.

WHEREAS the shifting of these fees ensures that student resources will better be utilized and improve the services provided for the students' education.

WHEREAS an active and involved legislature leads to more student involvement. This will improve the entire student experience. Student organizations and educational departments will be able to utilize senators that have more experience and expertise, due to a renewed vested interest in the institution.

WHEREAS Senators will be compensated with a stipend to reward their hard work. The guidelines for fulfilling the obligations and receiving the stipend will be spelled out in a separate document. To be voted on separately by the legislature. The reason for separating these documents is to preserve flexibility of these obligations and stipend amounts for future administrations.

WHEREAS the net effect on student costs who are attending the university will be as follows:

- Full time students attending Fall, Spring, and Summer semesters will save \$5.
- Full time students attending Fall and Spring semesters will save \$2.
- Part time students attending Fall, Spring, and Summer semester costs will not change.
- Part time students attending Fall and Spring semesters costs will increase by \$3.

WHEREAS, based on current enrollment projections the net savings on the entire student body will be to the sum of \$13,000.

WHEREAS, the accompanying document, Attachment 1, is to serve as the Senator Expectation Program and Guide. Such is to lay out clearly the procedures that are to be followed for proper involvement in the program and how the program is to be managed.

WHEREAS the student government senate shall be vested with the authority to amend the Senator Expectation Program and Guide granted a simple majority in the upper house of the legislature followed by the approval of the SGA President. If vetoed by the SGA President, a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the senate may ratify the proposed amendment.

WHEREAS Attachment 1 reads as follows:



Student Government Association McNeese State University Senator Expectation Program and Guide



Purpose:

This program is designed to reward senators for active participation in the Student Government and the campus as a whole. If this agreement is opted into there will be a monetary stipend provided to each senator who fulfills the expectations to be discussed. This document is intended to provide a statement of voluntary consent for each senator and to clarify the expectations of this program. It will also provide information pertinent to help senators reach their goal and give a tentative schedule of events held by SGA that senators will have a chance to participate. There will be a notes and comments portion at the end of the document where prospective senators have a chance to voice concerns or share information with SGA officers for the betterment of the program and Student Government in general. This commitment will match the standard senator term. To be immediately terminated upon the vacating of the senate seat.

Senator Participation Packages:

Level One Civil Service Package: \$150 Stipend rewarded upon completion of the requirements at the end of the semester. The requirements for this package are to obtain <u>35 points</u> total after point reductions are accounted for and attend the Senator orientation meeting in August (point system will be explained in the next section of this paper).

Level Two Distinguished Civil Service Package: \$250 Stipend rewarded upon completion of the requirements at the end of the semester. The requirements for this package are to obtain 65 points after point reductions are accounted for and attend the Senator orientation meeting in August (point system will be explained in the next section of this paper).

Point System Explanation:

The points necessary to compete the expectations of this program are acquired by attending events, dutifully serving on committees, and scheduling meetings with organizations unaffiliated with the senator making the meeting.

SGA Senate Project Fund: Direct involvement in the yearly senate campus project will provide <u>10 points</u> towards reaching requirements for the service packages. The senate project lead in cooperation with the Speaker of the House shall be the arbiters of what is to constitute involvement. The Speak of the House is to either take lead or assign lead of the project to another member of the upper house of the SGA legislature.

Committee Service: Committee service will provide 10 points towards reaching requirements for the service packages. Points will not be rewarded if SGA executive officers deem that the senator did not sufficiently fulfill the obligation toward the committee to which they have assigned themselves to. Senators can serve on three committees for a total of 30 points. Potential Committees to serve on include both University and SGA Committees. At the beginning of the Fall Semester, Senators will be given a chance to choose the committee/committees they wish to serve on. If committee positions are still open after senators are given the chance to choose, they will be assigned by the President and Speaker of the House to fill vacant positions.

Major SGA Events: Major SGA events will be held approximately every month. They will be events that require moderate to extensive amounts of preparation. Senators will be given a chance to work the set up for the event or at the event by gathering information and facilitating the success of the event at the discretion of the SGA officer who presides over the event. This will usually be the Vice President, but other officers can assume that role if there are scheduling conflicts or if an event is geared towards the particular interest of a specific officer. Ultimate authority on who is the presiding officer over the event rests with the president and will be communicated ahead of time. In the Scheduling portion of this document planned major events will be designated as such by an asterisk. Every senator must help or attend at least <u>One event</u> per semester and will be rewarded <u>10 points</u> for participation if deemed a sufficient effort by the presiding officer. Any number of events can be

attended/worked by a senator, but a maximum of <u>30 points</u> can be rewarded for any individual senator.

Minor SGA Events: Minor SGA events will be held more frequently with one happening approximately every two weeks, at the discretion of the president. These events should only require a small amount of preparation and planning. This will include tabling events and events such as, SGA Knows the Way. The Speaker of the House will usually be the officer who handles attendance for these events, however, such as is the case with big events this can be transferred to another officer as need or particular interest arises. Ultimate authority on who is the presiding officer over the event rests with the president and will be communicated ahead of time. Ultimate authority on who is the presiding officer over the event rests with the president and will be communicated ahead of time. In the Scheduling portion of this document planned minor events will be designated as such by a text in italics. Every senator must help or attend at least One event per semester and will be rewarded 5 points for participation if deemed a sufficient effort by the presiding officer. Any number of events can be attended/worked by a senator, but a maximum of 15 points can be rewarded for any individual senator.

McNeese Community Events: SGA senators will be required to attend at least <u>one</u> McNeese cultural event. This includes sporting events, plays, band or choir performances, specific cultural events, such as Nepali Night, or organizational function. It must be an event the senator is otherwise unaffiliated. Student Tailgates Do Not Count for This Requirement, although you are encouraged to go. To receive credit for fulfilling this requirement the senator must provide some sort of proof of attendance to the Speaker of the House preferably, or another executive officer if the Speaker is unavailable. These events will be worth <u>5 points each</u>, with a maximum of <u>10 points</u> counting towards fulfilling the program requirements.

Causes for Senator Point Deductions:

- More than One unexcused absence at weekly SGA Meetings -5
 points. After first deduction each additional unexcused absence
 will incur an additional -5-point penalty. Contact SGA Secretary
 for excused absence guidelines, if unable to contact them, then
 contact SGA President.
- Not showing up to minor event previously committed to, unless given a satisfactory excuse to presiding officer of that event -5 points.
- Not showing up to major event previously committed to, unless given a satisfactory excuse to presiding officer of that event -10 points.

 Unexcused absence for committee meetings. Contact the individual committee chairmen for excused absence guidelines. If unable to contact them, then contact SGA President.

As a general rule, prompt and proper communication with the correct SGA official is necessary to receive an excuse from a prior commitment from an individual senator. Emergencies will be treated differently, at the discretion of the SGA President.

As a general protection for senators, no senator can have less than *Negative 10 points* for a given semester

SGA Senate Project Fund Constitution

Purpose

The enaction of the SGA Senate Project will serve to give senators a direct avenue for change withing the student government. This fund will under the control of the SGA senate, with the supervision of the SGA president, SGA Advisor, and the advisor for the Campus Development Committee. This project fund will be utilized by the senate for student lead development and to encourage widespread student involvement. This will encourage engagement with the student body and develop leadership skills for SGA Senators.

Article I: Membership

The Senate project shall be comprised of all SGA senators. The SGA speaker of the house will be the default leader of this project fund. Although, the leadership of this project can be delegated by the speaker to any other member of the senate, should they so choose. The SGA officers, SGA advisor, and advisor for the Campus development committee will be friends of the senate, to work in cooperation with the SGA senate and speaker of the house. The SGA advisor, and advisor for the Campus Development Committee shall function to ensure that legal practices and administrative standards are met, under the leadership of the higher body of the student legislature.

Article II: Voting and Meetings:

The initiation of the Senator project fund shall follow standard SGA legislative procedures. That being that a simple majority is met in the senate. Following that, the legislation shall be sent to the SGA President to be approved. If approved, it proceeds as proposed. However, in the event of a veto, it will be sent back to the senate and can be approved by a 2/3 majority vote. If unable to pass with a 2/3 majority vote the proposal shall be considered dead. In the event of SGA presidential approval, the proposal shall be sent to the SGA advisor and advisor for the Campus Development Committee for approval. Should they agree, it will proceed forward as proposed. Failing an approval by both advisors, the university president shall serve as the tie breaking vote. Business relating to the senator project fund shall take place at the standard SGA meeting.

Article III: Senate Floor Proposal Procedures

Section I

All project proposals must contain all three of the following a project overview, an outline for implementation, and a broad expenditure breakdown.

Section II

All proposals must be submitted to the Speaker of the House to be turned over to the SGA President no less than a week before the proposal reaches the senate floor. The proposal must sit on the senate floor for at least a week to be voted on at the next scheduled SGA meeting.

Article IV: Scope of Project and Limitations

Section I

Projects must benefit the McNeese student body at large and hold the student's best interest to the highest regard. The scope of project proposals can include, however are not limited to, infrastructure projects, renovations, purchasing of equipment, service projects, bolstering university services, events open to all students, and the beautification of campus. (some examples include: equipment for the rec, memorials for notable persons, benches around campus, fences, banners, etc.)

Section II

All projects are to be limited to occurring on and to McNeese State University property. Funds are to not be used for off-campus events or any extent of travel.

Article V: Financial Scope limitations

Section I

The cost summation of all projects passed are to not exceed the current dollar amount available in the SGA Senate Project Fund account. SGA Senate Project Fund current dollar amount is the summation of the revenues collected by the fee and the unused monies left in the account by the previous senate.

Section II

No deficit spending is to be allowed by any individual project or by the summation of multiple projects. Project proposals however can request to cooperate with the institution, including but not limited to departments, colleges, university committees, and chartered and student organizations, for the execution of any given project.

Article VI: Amendments to the Constitution

The creator of the constitution was the McNeese State University Student Government Association and the McNeese State University President. Any changes to the constitution must be approved by the University President, SGA President and a two-thirds vote of the SGA Senate.

Item I.2. University of New Orleans' request for approval to enter into a cooperative endeavor agreement with Bastian Enterprises.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The University of New Orleans is requesting approval to enter into a cooperative endeavor with Bastian Enterprises and the University's Advanced Materials Research Institute (AMRI) to develop tests and vaccines for control of Chronic Wasting Disease (CDW) and other transmissible spongiform encephalopathies.

Bastian Enterprises is a Louisiana startup biotechnology company working to develop tests and vaccines for control of CDW and other transmissible spongiform encephalopathies, and AMRI is a recognized world leader in nanomaterials research. The project will allow for the exchange of ideas, development of new technologies involving Bastian Enterprises and AMRI researchers, characterization of materials prepared through this collaboration using state-of-the-art instrumentation, training undergraduate and graduate students in biomaterials, and the development of state and federal research proposals in basic and applied research.

The collaboration will: serve the public through development of a small business in technology (Bastian enterprises will employ Louisiana workers, including UNO students and graduates); serve to elevate UNO faculty research programs through development of new collaborative projects; will bring in additional federal funds through applied research programs and small business development grants; and will serve to train undergraduate students through internships and graduate students through collaborative projects.

COOPERATIVE ENDEAVOR AGREEMENT

THIS COOPERATIVE ENDEAVOR, made and entered into this 1st day of March, 2021, by and between the University of New Orleans, a member of the University of Louisiana System, hereinafter referred to as "University," and/or "UNO" and Bastian Enterprises, LLC, hereinafter referred to as "Contracting Party" and/or "Bastian Enterprises".

ARTICLE I

WITNESSETH:

- 1.1 WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 14(C) of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana provides that "For a public purpose, the state and its political subdivisions...may engage in cooperative endeavors with each other, with the United States or its agencies, or with any public or private association, corporation, or individual;" and
- 1.2 WHEREAS, the University desires to cooperate with the Contracting Party in the implementation of the Project as hereinafter provided;
- 1.3 WHEREAS, the University has the authority to enter into this Agreement as evidenced by its governmental purpose to perform its public higher education mission of instruction, research and public service.
- 1.4 WHEREAS, the public purpose of the Project is described as: Bastian Enterprises is a Louisiana startup biotechnology company working to develop tests and vaccines for control of Chronic Wasting Disease (CDW) and other transmissible spongiform encephalopathies and the University's Advanced Materials Research Institute (AMRI) is a recognized world leader in nanomaterials research. Bastian Enterprises and AMRI will team up on the study of wall-less bacteria (Mollicute). Initial projects, for example, will investigate the structure and composition of a novel spiroplasma bacterium. The immediate proximity of Bastian Enterprises to AMRI readily allows for the exchange of ideas, the development of new technologies involving Bastian Enterprises and AMRI researchers, characterization of materials prepared through this collaboration using AMRI state of the art instrumentation, the training of undergraduate and graduate students in biomaterials, and the development of state and federal research proposals in basic and applied research. Further, the proximity of Bastian Enterprises to AMRI researchers will serve as a model for the development of other small businesses based on existing or new AMRI technologies involving various biomaterials. All of these aspects of this collaborative agreement will: 1) serve the public through the development of a small business in biotechnology - Bastian Enterprises will employ Louisiana workers including students and graduates from UNO; 2) serve to elevate the research programs of UNO faculty through the development of new collaborative projects; 3) will bring in additional federal funding through applied research programs (NSF, DOE, etc.) and small business development grants (SBIR); and 4) will serve to train undergraduate students through internships and graduate students through collaborative projects between AMRI faculty and Bastian Enterprises.

- 1.5 WHEREAS, the University has a reasonable expectation of receiving a benefit or value described in detail that is at least equivalent to or greater than the consideration described in this Agreement;
- 1.6 WHEREAS, the transfer or expenditure of public funds or property is not a gratuitous donation;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and the mutual covenants herein contained, the parties hereto agree as follows:

ARTICLE II SCOPE OF SERVICES

2.1 The Contracting Party shall:

- a) Engage in collaborative research with AMRI researchers involving the development techniques for the characterization of spiroplasma bacteria.
- b) Work with AMRI researchers to seek state and federal funding in applied research and the development of small business.
- c) Provide internships for UNO undergraduates giving them training in test development, vaccine development, and spiroplasma characterization.
- d) Provide training in test development, vaccine development, and spiroplasma characterization to graduate students that work for collaborating AMRI researchers.
- e) Give seminars at least 1-2 times a year, as part of the AMRI weekly program, on developments in Bastian Enterprises in test development, vaccine development, mollicute bacteria characterization, and small business development. The latter will be especially important for those AMRI faculty that are planning the development of their own small businesses.

ARTICLE III DELIVERABLES

3.1 Deliverables:

- a) Collaborative research with AMRI researchers will be established in techniques for the characterization of spiroplasma bacteria. Planned targets include the morphological and compositional studies of key spiroplasma bacteria.
- b) Bastian Enterprises and AMRI researchers will apply for state and federal grants to further Bastian Enterprises and UNO faculty research; these will include the Board of Regents Industrial ties program and NSF and/or DOE small business grants.

- c) Bastian Enterprises will host UNO undergraduates in internships in test development, vaccine development, and spiroplasma characterization.
- d) Bastian Enterprises researchers will give seminars sharing their expertise in test development, vaccine development, spiroplasma characterization, and the development of small businesses.

ARTICLE IV BENEFITS TO CONTRACTING PARTY

4.1 In consideration of the services described above, the University hereby agrees to provide benefits to the Contracting Party. Benefits will be received/provided in the following manner:

The Contracting Party will receive a reduced rental rate for space in UNO's Science Building. The benefits received by the University are commensurate with the benefits provided to the Contracting Party because the benefits received by the University are more than worth the value of reduced rent. These benefits include: the advancement in AMRI programs in the science and engineering of materials, development and discovery of new materials and materials applications, training of undergraduates through internship opportunities, and seminars on the technology and small business aspects of Bastian Enterprises.

4.2 Additional Costs and Expenses. No additional costs or expenses incurred by the Contracting Party in performance of this Agreement shall be reimbursed or paid by the University unless agreed upon in writing by the parties.

ARTICLE V TERMINATION FOR CAUSE

5.1 See Article XLIV.

ARTICLE VI NOT USED

6.1 Not used.

ARTICLE VII

OWNERSHIP OF WORK PRODUCT, CONFIDENTIALITY AND COPYRIGHT

7.1 It is understood that any intellectual property developed solely by Contracting Party will be owned by Contracting Party, including but not limited to, any intellectual property developed solely by Contracting Party while on the Leased Premises, using University/AMRI equipment, or utilizing University/AMRI administrative staff, lab technicians, students or others who provide technical/administrative or other support. Any intellectual property developed by University will be owned by University. Any intellectual property jointly developed will be jointly owned by respective party and such joint efforts or collaboration shall be clarified in advance of such development in good faith. Both parties will make good faith efforts to identify appropriate ownership regarding jointly developed intellectual property. The University and the Contracting Party will enter into a mutually agreeable collaboration/non-disclosure agreement.

ARTICLE VIII ASSIGNMENT

8.1 Contracting Party shall not assign any interest in this Agreement and shall not transfer any interest in same (whether by assignment or novation), without prior written consent of the University, provided however, that claims for money due or to become due to Contracting Party from the University may be assigned to a bank, trust company, or other financial institution without such prior written consent. Notice of any such assignment or transfer shall be furnished promptly to the University. Additionally, the Contracting Party shall not subcontract any work to any party without the prior written consent of the University.

ARTICLE IX FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE

9.1 Each recipient shall be audited in accordance with R.S. 24:513. If the amount of public funds received by the provider is below the amount for which an audit is required under R.S. 24:513, the transferring agency shall monitor and evaluate the use of the funds to ensure effective achievement of the project goals and objectives.

ARTICLE X AUDIT CLAUSE

- 10.1 It is hereby agreed that the Legislative Auditor of the State of Louisiana, and/or the Office of the Governor, Division of Administration auditors shall have the option of inspecting and auditing all data, records and accounts of the Contracting Party which relate to this Agreement, upon request.
- 10.2 The Contracting Party and any subcontractors paid under this Agreement shall maintain all books and records pertaining to this Agreement for a period of four years after the date of final payment under the prime contract and any subcontract entered into under this Agreement or four years from the date of termination of the prime contact and any subcontract entered into under this Agreement, whichever is later.

ARTICLE XI AMENDMENTS IN WRITING

Any alteration, variation, modification, or waiver of provisions of this Agreement shall be valid only when it has been reduced to writing and executed by all parties.

ARTICLE XII FISCAL FUNDING (NON-APPROPRIATION) CLAUSE

12.1 In the event funds are not budgeted or appropriated in any fiscal year for payments due under this Agreement for the then current or succeeding fiscal year, this Agreement shall impose no obligation on the University as to such current or succeeding fiscal year, and said Agreement shall become null and void, and no right of action shall accrue to the benefit of the Contracting Party, its successors or assigns for any further payments.

ARTICLE XIII TERM OF AGREEMENT

13.1 The term of this Agreement shall commence on March 1, 2021 and shall continue in effect until February 28, 2022, unless sooner terminated as provided in Paragraph XLIV. This agreement may be extended for additional periods by mutual agreement of the parties.

ARTICLE XIV DISCRIMINATION CLAUSE

14.1 The Contracting Party agrees to abide by the requirements of the following as applicable: Title VI and VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended by the Equal Opportunity Act of 1972, Federal Executive Order 11246, the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, the Vietnam Era Veteran's Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, as amended, the Age Act of 1975, as amended, and Contracting Party agrees to abide by the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, as amended. Contracting Party agrees not to discriminate in its employment practices and will render services under this Agreement without regard to race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, national origin, veteran status, political affiliation, or disabilities. The Contracting Party acknowledges and agrees that any act of unlawful discrimination committed by Contracting Party, or any other failure to comply with these statutory obligations when applicable shall be grounds for termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE XV INDEMNIFICATION; INSURANCE

15.1 See Articles XXXVIII and XL.

ARTICLE XVI PARTIAL INVALIDITY; SEVERABILITY

16.1 If any term, covenant, condition, or provision of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall, at any time or to any extent, be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement, or the application of such term, covenant, condition or provision to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby, and each term, covenant, condition, and provision of this Agreement shall be valid and be enforced to the fullest extent permitted by law.

ARTICLE XVII ENTIRE AGREEMENT; MODIFICATION

17.1 This Agreement, including any attachments that are expressly referred to in this Agreement, contains the entire agreement between the parties and supersedes any and all agreements or contracts previously entered into between the parties. No representations were

made or relied upon by either party, other than those that are expressly set forth. This Agreement may be modified or amended at any time by mutual consent of the parties, provided that, before any modification or amendment shall be operative and valid, it shall be reduced to writing and signed by both parties.

ARTICLE XVIII CONTROLLING LAW

18.1 The validity, interpretation, and performance of this Agreement shall be controlled by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana.

ARTICLE XIX LEGAL COMPLIANCE

19.1 The University shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws and regulations, including, specifically, the Louisiana Code of Governmental Ethics (R.S. 42:1101, et seq.) in carrying out the provisions of this Agreement.

ARTICLE XX RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE PARTIES; EXCLUSION OF BENEFITS

20.1 The Contracting Party is engaged by the University for the purposes set forth in this Agreement. The relationship between the Contracting Party and the University shall be, and only be, that of an independent contractor and the Contracting Party shall not be construed to be an employee, agent, partner of, or in joint venture with, the University.

ARTICLE XXI <u>ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF EXCLUSION OF WORKER'S COMPENSATION</u> <u>COVERAGE</u>

21.1 The University and the Contracting Party expressly agree that the Contracting Party is an independent contractor as defined in R.S. 23:1021(7) and, as such, expressly agree that the University shall not be liable to the Contracting Party or to anyone employed by the Contracting Party for any benefits or coverage as provided by the Worker's Compensation Law of the State of Louisiana.

ARTICLE XXII ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF EXCLUSION OF UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION COVERAGE

22.1 The University and the Contracting Party expressly declare and acknowledge that the Contracting Party is an independent contractor and, as such, is being engaged by the University under this Agreement as noted and defined in R.S. 23:1472(12)(E) and, therefore, it is expressly declared and understood between the parties hereto, that for the purposes of unemployment compensation only: A. The Contracting Party has been and will be free from any control or

direction by the University over the performance of the services covered by this Agreement; B. The services to be rendered by the Contracting Party are outside the normal course and scope of the University's usual business; and C. The Contracting Party is customarily engaged in an independently established trade, occupation, profession, or business. Consequently, neither the Contracting Party nor anyone employed or contracted by the Contracting Party shall be considered an employee of the University for the purpose of unemployment compensation coverage.

ARTICLE XXIII FORCE MAJEURE

23.1 Neither party to this Agreement shall be responsible to the other party hereto for any delays or failure to perform caused by any circumstances reasonably beyond the immediate control of the party prevented from performing, including, but not limited to, acts of God.

ARTICLE XXIV EMPLOYMENT OF STATE PERSONNEL

24.1 The Contracting Party certifies that it has not employed and will not employ any person to engage in the performance of this Agreement who is, presently, or at the time of such employment, an employee of the State of Louisiana.

ARTICLE XXV COVENANT AGAINST CONTINGENT FEES

25.1 The Contracting Party warrants that it has not employed or retained any entity or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the Contracting Party, to solicit or secure this Agreement, and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any entity or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the Contracting Party any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift, or any other consideration, contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this Agreement. For breach or violation of this warranty, the University shall have the right to annul this Agreement without liability or, in University's discretion, to deduct from the contract price or consideration, or otherwise recover the full amount of such fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift, or contingent fee.

ARTICLE XXVI REMEDIES FOR DEFAULT

26.1 See Article XLIV.

ARTICLE XXVII NOTICES

27.1 All notices and other communications pertaining to this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be transmitted either by personal hand-delivery (and receipted for) or deposited in the United States mail, as certified mail, return receipt requested and postage prepaid, to the other party, addressed as follows:

ARTICLE XXVIII PREMISES

28.1 PREMISES. University owns a tract of property with improvements located at 2000 Lakeshore Drive, New Orleans, LA 70148, hereinafter referred to as "University's Tract", and Contracting Party wishes to lease a part thereof. University agrees to lease and does hereby lease to Contracting Party and Contracting Party does hereby agree to lease and does hereby lease from University, delivery of possession of which is hereby acknowledged, a portion of University's Tract, hereinafter referred to as the "Leased Premises". The Leased Premises shall consist of that portion of the University of New Orleans' Science Building ("Science Building"), an improvement located on University's Tract, totaling approximately 701.6 square feet. This 701.6 square feet is lab space in Science 1047, 1047A and 1047B. Licensee may use other University equipment for an additional charge. The use of the lab benches and sinks are included in this Agreement. Licensee may use other University equipment for an additional charge. The Contracting Party will have shared use of Common Areas as described herein.

ARTICLE XXIX NOT USED

29.1 NOT USED

ARTICLE XXX RENT

30.1 RENT. Rental rates have been calculated as follows: \$15.30 per square foot for 701.6 square feet of laboratory space and \$12.60 per square foot for any future office space. This Agreement is made for an annual rent of \$10,734.48 which is an average price per square foot of \$15.30. Rent is payable in a monthly amount of EIGHT HUNDRED NINETY-FOUR AND 54/100 DOLLARS (\$894.54) due on the first day of each month, in advance, to University, at University's permanent mailing address as noted in section 27 of this agreement. Electrical, water, gas, taxes, property insurance, flood insurance, basic ongoing repairs, A/C & heating systems, lawn care, pest control (including termite), fire system maintenance, and waste management are the responsibility of the University. Telephone, internet, cable, janitorial and disposal of waste (other than common trash) are the responsibility of Contracting Party. Internet and phone service, if needed will be through Cox cable, which will be invoiced separately.

Parking will be available to Licensee's employees and guests according to UNO's Parking Policies http://www.uno.edu/upd/docs/UNOParking2014.pdf

ARTICLE XXXI COMMON AREAS

COMMON AREAS. Contracting Party will have the non-exclusive right, along with 31.1 the other tenants of the Science Building and their employees and invitees, to use the parking areas, landscaped areas, entrance ways, hallways, elevators, fire stairs, restrooms, loading dock and other areas designated from time to time by University for common tenant use (the "Common Areas"). In using the Common Areas, Contracting Party will not impede the use of the Common Areas by other tenants, and Contracting Party will use its best efforts to prevent its employees and invitees from loitering in the Common Areas or using the Common Areas for other than their intended purpose. University will have exclusive control and management over the Common Areas and will have the right, from time to time, to establish rules and regulations with respect to the use of the Common Areas, to restrict parking by employees of Contracting Party to designated parking areas, to close temporarily any portion of the Common Areas, and to increase, reduce, reconfigure, or change the Common Areas in any way University determines to be necessary or desirable. University will have no liability to Contracting Party by reason of any such closure, increase, reduction, reconfiguring, or other change in the Common Areas.

Contracting Party shall use its best efforts to cause its agents, employees, permittees and invitees to keep the Common Areas in good condition. Any dispute between Contracting Party and any other tenant on University's Tract regarding the repair, upkeep, maintenance, and appearance of the Common Areas or use of the Common Areas shall be resolved by a meeting with the parties and an agreement between the parties. University shall decide what, if any, repairs, upkeep, and maintenance shall be performed to the Common Areas and University shall select the contractor to perform any such repair, upkeep, and maintenance.

ARTICLE XXXII USE OF PREMISES

32.1 USE OF PREMISES. Contracting Party may use the Leased Premises only for conducting research related to advancing the study and prevention of diseases in the fields of obesity, diabetes, tissue engineering, and regenerative medicine. Contracting Party shall not cause or permit any hazardous or toxic substances to be present on or about University's Tract. The Common Areas are for the use of Contracting Party and University and all of University's tenants on University's Tract. Contracting Party shall not make any use of Leased Premises and Common Areas in violation of any statutes, ordinances, or laws and shall not permit any contamination or pollution on or about the premises or increase the fire or insurance hazard by any use thereof.

ARTICLE XXXIII REPAIRS, UPKEEP AND MAINTENANCE

33.1 REPAIRS, UPKEEP AND MAINTENANCE. Contracting Party shall keep the Common Areas and Leased Premises in as good condition as they were in when received, caring for them as a prudent administrator would care for his own property.

University shall be responsible for all ordinary upkeep, maintenance, and repairs to the Leased Premises arising from use of the premises except those repairs which are necessitated in whole or in part by the fault or neglect of Contracting Party. University shall select the contractor to perform any such upkeep, maintenance, and repairs. University shall be responsible for extraordinary repairs to the structure and roof of the building except those repairs which are necessitated in whole or in part by the fault or neglect of Contracting Party.

Contracting Party shall provide, install and pay all costs and expenses associated with equipment he may need to conduct his business and operations from the Leased Premises.

At the termination of this Agreement, by expiration of the term or otherwise, Contracting Party shall return Leased Premises in as good an order as they were when received, free from any contamination or pollution.

ARTICLE XXXIV CONTAMINATION OR POLLUTION

34.1 CONTAMINATION OR POLLUTION. Contracting Party and their employees shall use their best efforts to keep University's Tract free from any and all contamination and pollution, whether resulting from any overfill, discharge, spill, or other release of toxic or hazardous substances or otherwise. Contracting Party agrees to notify University immediately of any and all contamination or pollution on or about University's Tract, including but not limited to, notice of any and all overfills, spills, discharges, or other releases of petroleum products on or about University's Tract irrespective of the cause of such.

Contracting Party and their employees shall conform to any and all federal, state, or local laws or ordinances concerning the storage, handling, transportation, sale, or distribution of all hazardous or toxic substances and shall use their best effort to cause their permittees and invitees to conform thereto, and Contracting Party will save and hold University harmless for any charge or liability resulting from same. Contracting Party shall promptly reimburse University for Contracting Party's pro rata share of any costs, charges or assessments related to any environmental monitoring by any governmental entity or regulatory authority that resulted from contaminants caused by Contracting Party, which shall be considered as additional rent. If contaminants were caused by University, University will pay all of the associated costs listed above.

ARTICLE XXXV RENOVATIONS, ALTERATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS

35.1 RENOVATIONS, ALTERATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS. Contracting Party shall not construct any improvements on or make any renovations or alterations to the Common Areas or Leased Premises without first obtaining the written consent of University. All such renovations, alterations, and improvements constructed by Contracting Party shall become the property of University upon expiration or termination of this Agreement unless University requires removal of all or part of such improvements by Contracting Party, in which event such improvements as may be designated by University shall be removed by Contracting Party, at Contracting Party's expense, within thirty (30) days of the expiration or termination of this Agreement. Damages, if any, caused by such removal shall be repaired at Contracting Party's expense.

Any and all installations, improvements or other work performed by or for Contracting Party to the Leased Premises shall, upon termination of this Agreement, become property of the University.

Prior to the commencement of any of the renovations, alterations, or improvements described herein above, Contracting Party shall promptly notify University, in writing, of all construction work being undertaken or planned, the costs and expenses thereof, all purchase orders or agreements therefore, and the dates upon which Contracting Party shall pay such costs and expenses. Upon request by University, Contracting Party shall promptly furnish University with copies of all such documents. All renovations, alterations, or improvements shall be done in a thoroughly workmanlike manner and at the sole cost and expense of Contracting Party, all of which costs and expenses shall be promptly and timely paid by Contracting Party.

ARTICLE XXXVI BONDING OUT LIENS

36.1 BONDING OUT LIENS. In the event Contracting Party makes any renovations, alterations, or improvements as provided herein, and a laborer's or material man's lien is filed against University's Tract or any part thereof as a result of said renovations, alterations or improvements, Contracting Party shall promptly deposit with the recorder of mortgages of Orleans Parish, Louisiana, a bond guaranteeing payment of said lien in accordance with Louisiana Revised Statute 9:4835, as amended.

ARTICLE XXXVII ASSIGNMENT AND SUBLEASE

37.1 ASSIGNMENT AND SUBLEASE. Contracting Party shall not have the right to sublease and/or assign any portion of the Leased Premises.

ARTICLE XXXVIII INSURANCE

38.1 INSURANCE. University shall obtain and maintain fire and extended coverage insurance on University's Tract and such insurance shall be for the sole benefit of University. All proceeds, payments, and rights to proceeds and payments made by an insurer pursuant to said policies are payable only to University and Contracting Party shall not be a beneficiary of said policies. Any insurance payments or proceeds shall be used to repair and restore, to the extent possible, the Common Areas and Leased Premises to their pre-damage condition; however, University shall not be obligated to make repairs to the extent that the cost of such repairs exceeds the amount of the insurance payments or proceeds actually received.

Contracting Party shall, at their own cost and expense, obtain and maintain such other insurance as it deems desirable on the property and improvements of Contracting Party located on or about the Leased Premises. Contracting Party shall, at all times during the term of this Agreement, at their own cost and expense, fully protect themselves and University against loss or liability by carrying Workers' Compensation and public liability insurance with responsible insurance companies authorized to do business in Louisiana, insuring against all hazards and risks to which they may be subjected in connection with their operations on the Leased Premises and Common Areas. University shall be named as an additional insured. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing:

- a) Contracting Party shall carry an Employer's Liability and Workers' Compensation Liability Insurance policy for full coverage and protection against liability to employees.
- b) Contracting Party shall secure and keep in force, during the performance of the operations on the Leased Premises and Common Areas, such public liability and property damage insurance as shall protect them and the University from any and all claims for personal injury, including death, as well as claims for property damage, which may arise from Contracting Party's operations on the Leased Premises or Common Areas. The amount of such public liability insurance shall not be less than ONE MILLION AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$1,000,000.00) for injuries, including death, to any one person, and not less than ONE MILLION AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$1,000,000.00) as the result of any one accident. General liability insurance for property damage shall be in an amount not less than ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$100,000.00) for any one accident.

Prior to or subsequent to the commencement of this Agreement, Contracting Party, upon demand by University, shall furnish certificates of all insurance policies required in connection with this agreement as aforesaid, which policies shall be issued to Contracting Party and/or University, as their interests may appear, together with certificates certifying to University that all said insurance is in force and that said insurance will not be canceled or otherwise changed or modified during the term of this agreement without notifying University in writing at least thirty (30) days in advance of such cancellation.

Should Contracting Party's insurance be cancelled for any reason, University has the non-exclusive option, but not the obligation, of obtaining insurance coverage for the benefit of Contracting Party, the cost of which Contracting Party must pay and reimburse University promptly upon demand as additional rent.

ARTICLE XXXIX DESTRUCTION OF PREMISES

39.1 DESTRUCTION OF PREMISES. If the Leased Premises shall be destroyed or damaged by fire or otherwise during the term of this Agreement, the University shall restore the Leased Premises to substantially its former condition as promptly as is reasonably possible, the cost of which is limited to insurance payments or proceeds actually received as provided above. During any period in which Contracting Party is unable to occupy the premises on account of such damage, the rent due under this Agreement for said period shall be abated. In case the damage by fire or otherwise substantially reduces the use of the Leased Premises by the Contracting Party, but does not wholly prevent the reasonable use thereof, then, in such case, the rents due under this Agreement shall be abated in proportion to the diminished utility of the Leased Premises.

ARTICLE XL INDEMNITY

40.1 INDEMNITY. Contracting Party's assuming possession of the Leased Premises and Common Areas constitutes an admission that Contracting Party has examined them and found them in good and safe condition at that moment. Contracting Party agrees to hold University harmless from any and all responsibility whatsoever for any and all liability for loss, injuries, or damages caused by Contracting Party or others by any vice or defect of the Leased Premises and/or Common Areas caused in whole or in part by any act or omission by Contracting Party. Contracting Party expressly assumes all such liability, and Contracting Party agrees to indemnify and to hold University harmless from any loss, injury, or damage (including costs and reasonable attorney's fees) to any person or persons whomsoever, other than employees or invitees of University caused by Contracting Party, or to the property of any persons whomsoever arising out of the occupancy or use of the Leased Premises or Contracting Party's use of the Common Areas. Likewise, University agrees to indemnify and hold Contracting Party harmless for any loss, injuries, or damages caused by any latent defect in the property that could not be reasonably be detected by Contracting Party

ARTICLE XLI AMUSEMENT DEVICES AND VENDING MACHINES

41.1 AMUSEMENT DEVICES AND VENDING MACHINES. Contracting Party shall not maintain or otherwise allow any currency, coin or token operated amusement devices or video games on or about the Leased Premises or Common Areas. Contracting Party shall not maintain or otherwise allow any type of vending machine on or about the Leased Premises or Common Areas without University's prior consent.

ARTICLE XLII IMAGE REQUIREMENT

42.1 IMAGE REQUIREMENT. Contracting Party shall keep the Leased Premises and Common Areas in a clean and orderly condition to the satisfaction of University. Contracting Party shall not make use of outdoor advertising materials without University's prior consent. Contracting Party shall keep the Leased Premises in accordance with the image standards required by University.

ARTICLE XLIII INSPECTION OF LEASED PREMISES AND OTHER

43.1 INSPECTION OF LEASED PREMISES AND OTHER. The University and his agents shall have the right, but not the obligation, to enter upon and inspect all parts of the Leased Premises at any reasonable time for any lawful purpose; provided, however, that the foregoing shall be done with reasonable notice and without substantial interruption to or interference with the business being transacted therein. University may place any signs or markings on or about the Leased Premises and/or Common Areas relating to the leasing, sale or other disposition of the Leased Premises, University's Tract, or any part thereof. University shall also be entitled to allow others to inspect the Leased Premises in the event of any prospective lease, sale or other disposition of the Leased Premises, University's Tract or any part thereof.

ARTICLE XLIV <u>DEFAULT</u>

- 44.1 DEFAULT. At the option of University, the rent for the unexpired term of this Agreement shall become due if any of the following listed events occur and Contracting Party fails to remedy same after having been given thirty (30) days prior written notice at the addresses herein designated:
- (a) If Contracting Party fails to pay any installment of rent, additional rent or expenses assumed by Contracting Party in this Agreement promptly, as stipulated.
- (b) If Contracting Party fails to comply with any of the provisions and/or conditions contained herein.
- (c) If the Leased Premises or Common Areas are abandoned or cease to be actively occupied and used for business purposes for a period in excess of thirty (30) days.
- (d) If any lien, privilege or other encumbrance is imposed or is filed against University's Tract or any portion thereof as a result of any act or omission by Contracting Party.

If any event listed above occurs, University shall have the further options to cancel this Agreement immediately, or proceed for past due installments of rent only, reserving the right to proceed for remaining installments later.

If Contracting Party fails or refuses to permit University to reenter the premises, University shall have the right to evict Contracting Party in accordance with the provisions of Louisiana

law, without forfeiting any of University's rights under this Agreement. Failure to strictly and promptly enforce any of the conditions of this Agreement shall not operate as a waiver of University's rights hereunder.

ARTICLE XLV ATTORNEY'S FEES

45.1 ATTORNEY'S FEES. On claims by University to collect fees owed by Contracting Party, Contracting Party shall pay University's costs and attorney's fees if University prevails as to any portion of such a claim. If Contracting Party prevails University will pay Consulting Party's costs and attorney's fees. Should either party fail to pay any sums due to other party under this Agreement, such sums shall bear interest at the rate of twelve percent (12%) per annum or the maximum amount allowed by Louisiana law from date due until paid.

ARTICLE XLVI WAIVER

46.1 WAIVER. The waiver by University of any breach of any term, covenant, condition or provision herein contained shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term, covenant, condition or provision with respect to any preceding or subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, condition or provision hereunder.

No term, covenant, condition or provision of this Agreement shall be deemed to have been waived by University, unless such waiver is in writing by University.

ARTICLE XLVII HOLDOVER BY CONTRACTING PARTY

47.1 HOLDOVER BY CONTRACTING PARTY. If Contracting Party shall not immediately surrender possession of the Leased Premises or Common Areas upon the expiration of this Agreement, Contracting Party, at the option of University, shall thereafter become a Contracting Party from month-to-month at a monthly rental equal to one and one-tenth times the previous month's rent installment, subject to all other conditions, provisions, and obligations of this Agreement insofar as the same are applicable to a month-to-month tenancy, and Contracting Party shall indemnify University against loss or liability resulting from Contracting Party's delay in so surrendering the Leased Premises or Common Areas including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees and any claim made by a succeeding Contracting Party founded on such delay.

ARTICLE XLVIII UNIVERSITY'S RIGHT TO CURE DEFAULTS

48.1 UNIVERSITY'S RIGHT TO CURE DEFAULTS. University, at any time and without notice, may, but shall not be obligated to, cure any default by Contracting Party of any of Contracting Party's obligations under this Agreement; and whenever University so elects, all costs and expenses incurred by University in curing any default, including, but not limited to,

reasonable attorney's fees, together with interest on the amount of costs and expenses so incurred at the legal rate, shall be paid by Contracting Party to University on demand, and shall be recoverable as additional rent.

ARTICLE XLIX SUBSTITUTION OF PREMISES

49.1 SUBSTITUTION OF PREMISES. University reserves the right to substitute for the Leased Premises comparable premises within the UNO campus (University's Tract) upon sixty (60) days prior written notice to Contracting Party. If University elects to make this substitution, the substitute premises will be leased to Contracting Party at the same Rent that Contracting Party is required to pay under this Agreement, and on the other terms of this Agreement, and University will pay all of Contracting Party's reasonable relocation costs, including, but not limited to, moving and telecommunications (including internet services).

ARTICLE L COMPLIANCE WITH RULES AND REGULATIONS

50.1 COMPLIANCE WITH RULES AND REGULATIONS. Contracting Party and Contracting Party's employees, agents, and visitors shall observe and comply with the Rules and Regulations that are annexed hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit "A" and all other reasonable rules and regulations that University may from time to time adopt. Additional rules and regulations will not be binding on Contracting Party until University has given Contracting Party notice of said rules and regulations. The **FRANCIS X. BRIDE PROFESSORSHIP IN PSYCHOLOGY** is designated for Psychology in the College of Nursing and Health Professions. Proposals and selection of the recipient for the Francis X. Bride Professorship in Psychology will be in accordance to the McNeese State University Professorship Policy.

McNeese State University Professorship Policy

Authority:

Academic Affairs and Enrollment Management

Date enacted or revised:

Revised January 16, 2013; December 14, 2015; August 2016; October 2017

Purpose

The McNeese State University Foundation provides endowed professorships according to university, Foundation, and Board of Regents guidelines. Endowments for professorships consist of private donations matched with State funds awarded by the Board of Regents. Endowed professorships are available to eligible faculty on a competitive basis providing funding is available and approved by the MSU Foundation. Endowed Professorships may be designated for a specific purpose or college or department or discipline in accordance with the objectives of the donation as well as Board of Regents and Foundation criteria. Use of Endowed Professorship funds support the McNeese State University Mission by: 1) enhancing teaching and applied research activity, 2) supporting undergraduate research opportunities, 3) sustaining the quality of academic programs through faculty and program development.

Eligibility for Endowed Professorship

Applicants must be full-time faculty members at McNeese with a rank of assistant professor or higher unless special undergraduate or applied research or other educational initiatives call for a broader applicant pool to include instructors. Deans, vice presidents, and the President are not eligible. Faculty members, including department heads, may apply for professorships designated for their respective disciplines, departments, or colleges. First-time full-time faculty are eligible to apply; continuing full-time faculty must be in good standing and must have achieved satisfactory ratings in all areas of the previous Annual Performance Report.

Selection Process

After the Foundation approves the status of endowed professorship funding, the provost informs college deans to begin the selection process. The dean may appoint a committee comprised of faculty or appropriate personnel to receive proposals and make recommendations for recipients. In cases where endowed professorships have specific designations, the dean or provost may appoint the endowed professor to support the objectives of the endowment and the University mission. The vice president for academic affairs and enrollment management, with approval of the vice president for university advancement, may designate professorships for specific initiatives provided the donor's objectives are met.

Note: Chairpersons for Endowed Professorship committees should not hold meetings which conflict with Faculty Senate meetings (the first Wednesday of the month from 3:10 to 5:00 p.m.). In addition, prior to committee meetings to select recipients, Endowed Professorship Committee Chairs should document the process for selecting recipients and provide the documentation to the dean.

Endowed Professorship Proposal and Length of Term

Endowed professorship appointments are for one to three years. A proposal describing the applicant's planned activities must be submitted to the committee or dean by the designated date announced each year. The proposal <u>must</u> have a title and include goals and objectives that support the university mission and are appropriate for the department in which the professor resides, e.g., grant funding, publications, applied research, undergraduate research, teaching, industrial ties, and other academic and/or economic development activities. Multi-year awarding of professorships remains contingent on available funds for each year of the award.

Selection of Endowed Professorship Recipients

Each committee receives and reviews proposals and makes recommendations to the dean. The dean ensures faculty criteria are met and forwards final recommendations to the provost for appointment. The provost makes the appointment for specifically designated professorships.

If selection committees determine that there are no qualified applicants, the dean and provost may appoint an eligible faculty member to fulfill the objectives of the endowment.

Endowed professorships are awarded for a one to three-year term. Recipients may reapply for professorships when funding is available, provided all reporting requirements are met, the proposal objectives for previous awards are met, and the faculty remains in good standing.

Endowed Professorship Reporting Requirements and Use of Funds

Endowed professorship funds may be used by faculty 1) to enhance teaching and applied research activity, 2) to support undergraduate research opportunities, 3) to enhance the quality of academic programs and faculty development. Endowed professorship funds may not be designated for the general discretionary use of departments, colleges, or the campus.

Implementation of the Award

The following occurs for the implementation of the award:

- 1. The recipient creates a projected budget for use of the funds.
- 2. The budget is submitted to the college dean for approval.
- 3. Once approved by the dean, the budget is submitted to the Office of Academic Affairs and Enrollment Management for final approval.
- 4. An expense account is established for the endowed professor and funds are placed in the account for use by the endowed professor; a letter of appointment is sent to the recipient with all pertinent account and reporting information.
- 5. Funds must be expended in accordance with State and University guidelines.
- The endowed professor submits annual written documentation and appropriate evidence of scholarly activity or proposal objectives along with expenditures completed to the college dean for review.
- The dean forwards approved reports to the Office of Academic Affairs and Enrollment Management.

- 8. Final reports are reviewed by the vice president for academic affairs and enrollment management and submitted to the Office of University Advancement and the Board of Regents for review. Note: A review team may be appointed by the vice president for academic affairs and enrollment management to evaluate progress of the recipient's activities based on the goals and objectives of the professorship.
- 9. Funds must be expended during the duration of the professorship and may not be held for future expenses not related to the goals of the professorship.
- 10. Residual funds may be utilized for general faculty development that supports the mission of the university. Endowed professorship recipients who leave the university or are reassigned duties do not receive endowed professorship funds remaining at the time of departure or reassignment.
- Endowed Professors should participate in donor recognition activities. The MSU Foundation provides information regarding donor recognition activities.

Level of Financial Support

The amount of funding per endowed professorship each year is determined by the MSU Foundation Board of Directors according to investment performance and other fiscal factors.

Termination of Endowed Professorship

The University reserves the right to terminate the award if 1) the recipient's actions are not appropriate as a representative of the University; or 2) the recipient fails to fulfill the obligations of the professorship or fails to fulfill obligations in a timely manner; or 3) the recipient suffers an incapacitating illness extending beyond one year; or 4) the recipient does not continue as a full-time faculty member at McNeese. The dean of the appropriate college will report cases involving possible termination to the vice president for academic affairs and enrollment management and a recommendation will be made to the President for final action. Any vacancy created by a termination will remain until the following year and any unused money will be allocated for faculty development supporting the objectives of the endowment.

Communication

This policy is distributed via Academic Advisory Council, Senior Staff, and the University Policy page.

The donor has not made any other stipulations and the donor leaves all e=decisions to the campus in perpetuity.



MCNEESE FOUNDATION PROFESSORSHIP POLICY STATEMENT

McNeese State University Foundation invests and manages its endowed professorship funds with priorities to protect the endowment corpus and seek investment earnings that provide consistent funding distributions to McNeese State University Endowed Professorship recipients for their use in fulfilling the University's mission. When determining an annual distribution amount, the Foundation considers such factors as the level of endowed professorship account balances exceeding corpus, investment earnings performance and forecasts and the University mission. The Foundation desires to provide consistent and predictable distribution to University professorship recipients so that they may appropriately plan their use. Endowed professorships are intended to exist in perpetuity and in no circumstance will the Foundation distribute funds that will jeopardize the original endowment corpus. Exceptions to this policy must be approved by the Foundation Board.

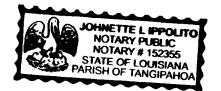

The University of Louisiana Monroe (ULM) Foundation is requesting \$20,000 in matching funds from the Louisiana Board of Regents to compliment a private donation of \$80,000 to create a \$100,000 endowment to support an endowed first generation undergraduate scholarship.

1. Need for the First Generation Scholarship

ULM is a state-supported university serving Northeast Louisiana and the Mississippi River Delta Region with an R3 Carnegie Classification that provides quality educational opportunities for students, faculty, and staff. Of the student population at ULM, 30% are first generation and 41% receive Pell grants.

2. Intended Purpose

The Sally Liew and Kevin Koh First Generation Endowed Scholarship to be matched by the Board of Regents Support Fund is established to increase college access and success for low income and first-generation students who are also full-time student-athletes. The University of Louisiana Monroe (ULM) is requesting \$20,000 in matching funds from the Louisiana Board of Regents to compliment a private donation of \$80,000 to create a \$100,000 endowment to support an endowed professorship in the fields of marketing and psychology.

1. Need for the Professorship

ULM is a state-supported university serving Northeast Louisiana and the Mississippi River Delta Region with an R3 Carnegie Classification that provides quality educational opportunities for students, faculty, and staff. As part of our mission, we seek to provide students with hands-on, active educational experiences that will give them a deeper understanding of the discipline and material. To do this, our faculty must be actively engaged in scholarship and research to provide the opportunities in which the students can get involved. In the marketing and psychology disciplines, maintaining an active research and scholarship agenda requires access to funding that is used to fund travel to conferences and equipment and supplies used for research. Through this professorship, we will be able to supply a faculty member with adequate funding to engage in research themselves as well as encourage students to engage in research.

2. Intended Purpose

The Marketing and Psychology Programs at ULM reside within the College of Business and Social Sciences. Combined, the Marketing and Psychology programs have 13 fulltime faculty (10 tenured/tenure-track) with 581 undergraduate majors and 238 graduate students.

The intended purpose of this professorship will be to increase the number of psychology and/or marketing faculty who are receiving external funding that supports faculty and student research and scholarship. The professorship will be awarded on the basis of proposals from the faculty that address how the funds from the endowment will support both faculty and student research in

the combined areas of marketing and psychology. Combined areas could include but are not limited to the psychology of consumers, buyer behavior, or consumer behavior.

3. Alignment of the Professorship with Campus's Role, Scope, Mission, and Strategic Priorities

This professorship is vital to ULM's role, mission, and strategic priorities. As previously stated, ULM is currently classified as an R3 institution. One of the goals of the institution is to improve our status to R2 so that we can better serve our students, the region, and the State. To do this, we will need to increase the amount and quality of faculty and student research and scholarship. By focusing the professorship the way that we are, this should support the attainment of the goal.

4. Selection Criteria for the Holder/Recipient

Interested faculty will submit proposals for projects to be conducted over three years or a three-year project to be supported by the fund. The proposal will need to outline how the funds will be used. The proposals need to include annual benchmarks for achievement against which progress will be measured. The proposals will be reviewed by a committee. Criteria for selection will include how well the proposals involve both fields of marketing and psychology, the societal impact of the research, as well as the level of student engagement.

5. Minimum Standards for the Performance of the Holder's Retention of the Professorship
This professorship will be awarded on a three-year basis, with an annual review of progress. That
progress will be measured against the agreed upon benchmarks in the proposal. Failure to
achieve these benchmarks will result in the professorship being removed and competition for it
reopened. At the end of the three-year period, the professorship will be open for a new
competition. While a previous professorship holder may apply for it again, they cannot apply
using the exact same proposal. However, the proposal could be an extension of a previously
awarded research project.

Need For Professorship

Education is at a critical juncture in both the State of Louisiana and the nation. While the COVID-19 pandemic has been a tremendous challenge for most aspects of almost every business or industry, one of its major effects on education has been to increase the severity of multiple issues that have been plaguing the teaching profession for some time. As an example, the last several decades has seen an extreme shortage of qualified teachers in several K-12 disciplines, such as in the sciences and mathematics. The lack of qualified teachers in these areas is a large reason why American students continue to underperform in these areas, and during this pandemic, the situation is only getting worse. The pandemic has forced some of the older, more-experienced faculty to retire due to health concerns, thereby exacerbating the situation. Historically, the poor performance of students in these areas has led to fewer students graduating in these areas and going into teaching. If this holds, the performance of this past year will mean even fewer well-qualified teachers in these areas in the future.

The pandemic has also exposed other issues in education that have been lingering. Teachers at all levels have had to rely more heavily on technology in order to continue to offer educational experiences to their students over the last year. Unfortunately, many of them were not prepared for this, and the ones that were prepared were met with a lack of technology infrastructure to allow them to offer quality programs to all of their students, as this technology is not cheap. The economic burden for this infrastructure has fallen hardest on underrepresented minorities, as they are disproportionally represented among the poorest sectors of society. This, in turn, has led to increasing the racial divide in education. The effect of this past year will only intensify this effect, which will have long-term effects on parity and equity in our country.

These issues are why the Dorothy and Ray Young Endowed Professorship could not have come at a better time. The faculty in the School of Education at the University of Louisiana -



Monroe (ULM) have been making headway on these issues for several years, but have been held back by a lack of resources to expand their work. For example, faculty in the School for the past year have been spearheading the creation of the Educators Rising Pathway program that is designed to increase the number of well-qualified teachers in Louisiana. This program identifies high school freshmen who might be interested in teaching and provides them foundational courses and experiences in education. Upon high school graduation, these students will have credit for several college-level education courses and will be well prepared to succeed in the studies to becoming a teacher. This program, which has received backing by the Louisiana Department of Education and the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education, was recently approved by the Louisiana State Workforce Commission Workforce Investment Council for full delivery.

Purpose of Professorship

Getting programs like this to a point of sustainability requires an investment of both time and money. Our faculty have shown that they are willing to put in the time, effort, and research for this, but they are often held back by the availability of resources to make these opportunities a reality. The Dorothy and Ray Young Endowed Professorship is exactly the type of resource that they need to bring such programs to fruition. Funds from this professorship will be used to research issues in education affecting the region, state, and/or nation, develop viable solutions to the problems raised by these issues, and then implement the solutions, with an eye to making the solutions sustainable for the future by producing the next generation of educators steeped in successful pedagogy and practices.

Alignment With Campus's Role, Scope, Mission, and Strategic Priorities,

This professorship is integral to ULM achieving its mission. The stated strategic mission of ULM is to prepare individuals to compete, succeed, and contribute in an ever-changing global society through a transformative education. Besides the successful education of both undergraduate and graduate students, it seeks to deliver services that support economic developments, especially to employers and communities in its region. Among its strategic priorities is the support of regional school districts by providing quality teachers who are well versed on practices and pedagogies that have been shown to successfully aid the educational missions of the regional K-12 systems. By providing the financial resources that will allow ULM faculty to continuously improve the education of future teachers, ULM will be able to continue to achieve this mission

Selection Criteria and Minimum Standards of Performance

The criteria for selecting recipients of this professorship will involve a mixture of past performance and proposed future work. All candidates for the professorship will submit a proposal by April 1st of the year in which the professorship becomes available that outlines the issue(s) they are seeking to address, the direction they will take to address the issue(s), what resources they will need to address the issue(s), a timeline for addressing the issue(s), and what products will be developed during and after the project. Per ULM guidelines, this project will have a three-year timeline, as all ULM endowed professorships are limited to this amount of time before they must be renewed with a new application. Applications will be scored using the University-developed rubric for evaluating endowed research proposal that rates the proposed work and the faculty member's past performance on research competitiveness, economic development, ties to regional constituencies and concerns, and regional/national eminence.

Each year, the holder of the endowed professorship will submit a progress report on their project by March 31st. This annual report will discuss how the project has progressed relative to the proposed timeline, lessons learned to date, and any products of the project that have been produced to date. The report will also discuss what work will be done over the coming year, which will serve as the basis for evaluating the project the next year. The Dean, Associate Dean, and the Director of the School of Education will evaluate the report and decide whether appropriate progress has been made on the project. If approved, the faculty member will be notified by April 30th. If denied, the endowed professorship will become vacant and a search will be started for the next award.

1. Summary

The University of New Orleans ("UNO") requests a \$40,000 match from the Board of Regents Support Fund to be combined with a \$160,000 gift to provide for a \$200,000 endowment for The Jerah W. Johnson Endowed Professorship in Maritime Studies and World History ("Endowed Professorship").

Overview of Professorship

University of New Orleans' History Department teaches history on an undergraduate and graduate level. Subject areas include:

- 1. United States History trace and examine the development of the United States, from before European settlement through early exploration, expansion, and modern times.
- 2. Non-Western History challenge established narratives of history by studying a variety of non-Western cultural perspectives: African, Asian, Indian, Middle Eastern, and Latin American.
- 3. European History learn about the cultural, economic, political, and social developments that shaped Europe's history and, by extension, our larger world.
- 4. World History
- 5. Louisiana History

Specialties areas include environmental history, African American history and the history of war.

Special collections include photographs from the Smithsonian National Museum of American History, the Louisiana State Museum, and others.

An Endowed Professorship in Maritime Studies and World History will be critical to recruit and retain faculty in this outstanding department. This Endowed Professorship would honor an exemplary faculty member who excels in the teaching of and research in maritime studies and/or world history, and the funds from the endowment can be used for faculty travel, research experiences and support for graduate students and undergraduates. The purpose of this agreement ("Agreement") is to summarize the mutual understanding between the Succession of Jerah W. Johnson, Ph.D. ("Donor") represented by Alan Stowell, executor ("Executor") and the University of New Orleans Foundation ("Foundation") regarding a gift to establish two endowment funds in support of two professorships in History ("Endowment Funds"). This Agreement will be made a part of the Foundation's records and is intended as a guide to those who will administer the Endowment Fund in the future.

I. University of New Orleans Foundation

The Foundation represents that it is a Louisiana non-profit corporation established to provide benefit to the University of New Orleans ("University"), a member institution under the supervision of the Board of Supervisors of Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College ("Board"), and is qualified as a tax-exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (Federal ID No. 72-1051326).

II. Description of the Gift

The purpose of this Gift is to provide private funds to endow two professorships ("Endowed Professorship"): a \$200,000 Endowed Professorship of which \$160,000 will be from the Gift and \$40,000 will be a match ("Match") from the Louisiana Board of Regents Support Fund Endowed Professorship Program ("BOR Program") and a \$100,000 Endowed Professorship, of which \$80,000 will be from the Gift and \$20,000 will be a Match. Both Endowed Professorships will be at the University specializing in the area of History.

The Endowed Professorships will be established to recruit superior new faculty and/or retain faculty whose research, teaching, and/or public service have uniquely contributed to the mission of his/her department and the University.

Should the Foundation anticipate that the Matches will be received longer than one academic year following the current academic year, Foundation may, with the Donor's consent hereby given, account for the Endowment Funds as general endowments and utilize spending allocation determined annually by the Foundation's Board of Directors to support the Endowed Professorships. When the Matches are received, the Endowment Funds would be considered BOR Program Endowments and not general endowments.

IV. Administration of the Fund

The Foundation manages all donated funds in accordance with Foundation, University and Board of Regents policies, when matched by the BOR Program, as amended from time to time and applicable laws and regulations. V. Future Considerations

The Foundation is grateful to the Donor for its support of the University and is committed to fulfilling the Donor's objectives as reflected in this Agreement. Occasionally, the purpose of particular Endowment Funds expires. When this occurs, the Foundation, under applicable Louisiana law, can re-designated the original gift to a similar compatible purpose. Therefore, in the unlikely event that the Foundation determines that the Endowment Funds are no longer used or needed for the original purpose, the Foundation with the approval of the Executor shall transfer the Endowment Funds to another similar purpose which it deems best honors the Donors' intentions, compatible with University priorities.

POLICY AND GUIDELINES FOR ENDOWED PROFESSORSHIPS September 22, 1994 Revised: June 26, 2006

Creation

The college dean, in consultation with the department chair and other appropriate administrative officials, is responsible for negotiating and formulating the agreement with the donor(s). It is recognized that donors may require certain conditions or a degree of participation in the activities of the endowed professor and, if so, these must be specified clearly in the agreement establishing the endowment. During its promulgation, the agreement must be reviewed by the Provost. A final draft of the agreement must be submitted to the Provost for approval.

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Nominees for an endowed professorship must hold a tenure-track position in an academic department or be eligible for that rank if selected from outside the university or be highly regarded in his or her discipline (e.g.; and artist, a musician, a professional practice faculty member). The dean of the college in which the candidate holds or will hold faculty rank is responsible for the selection process. Selection will be based on the candidate's record of creative and scholarly accomplishments and on the assessment, by experts in the appropriate field of the candidate's accomplishments and potential. If the endowed professorship is used as a recruiting tool to attract an outstanding new faculty member the normal university procedures for advertising, selecting, and hiring must be followed.

The dean of the college in which the endowed professor holds rank, or will hold rank, will determine and announce the dates when nominations will be accepted. Nomination materials minimally consist of a letter of nomination or application explaining why the nominee or applicant should receive the honor, a copy of the candidate's curriculum vita, a summary of competitive grants and honors received in the candidate's career, and a list of names and addresses of at least three off-campus experts in the field who could provide an evaluation of the candidate's work. If the candidate's work is interdisciplinary in nature, the relevant fields of the referees should be indicated. The dean must consult with the chair (unless the chair is among the candidates) of each on-campus candidate before a recommendation is made.

Appointment

The dean of the college of the endowed professor will make a recommendation to the Provost who will announce the appointment, subject to any approvals required by the UL System. The initial appointment of an endowed professor may be made at the beginning of the academic year following completion of the funding of the endowment. The letter appointing (or reappointing) an endowed professor should indicate what activities and accomplishments are expected of the faculty member during the term of the appointment. Appointment as endowed professor will be for a period of up to three years and may be renewed, subject to a satisfactory review. Renewal of an

appointment will be initiated by the dean after formal consultation with the department chair, appropriate faculty, an, if necessary, the donor. A recommendation for appointment or reappointment must be submitted to the Provost for approval.

Review for Reappointment

Near the end of an appointment term, the dean must conduct a formal review of the endowed professor to determine if the conditions of the appointment have been satisfied. A written summary of the dean's evaluation should be given to the endowed professor, the department chair, and the Provost along with the recommendation to reappoint or not reappoint.

Endowment Revenue

Normally, annual earnings from the endowment, which may be supplemented with university funds to a maximum of \$5,000, are used to support the research and teaching activities of the endowed professor. With the approval of the dean and Provost, the earnings (and supplement) may be distributed, in whole or in part, as (1) an endowment salary supplement plus the cost of fringe benefits that together total no more than \$5,000 or (2) to support or enhance research and/or teaching. An endowment stipend is not considered part of the faculty member's base pay.

Title

An endowed professorship title is honorary and not one of rank. The title may be used only for the duration of the appointment.

1. Profile of the Graduate Program(s) which the Scholarship will support

Program for Requested Support

The program that this request will support is the interdisciplinary Doctoral Engineering and Applied Sciences ("DENAS") program of which the University of New Orleans' Computer Science Department is the largest participant.

The University of New Orleans

The University of New Orleans {"UNO") is a comprehensive urban research university committed to providing educational excellence to a diverse undergraduate and graduate student body. It is Carnegie-classified as a Doctoral University with High Research Activity. UNO is the urban research university of Louisiana and, as such, plays a unique role in bringing an advanced educational experience to a diverse body of students with different backgrounds and professional interests. Both the undergraduate and graduate students are predominantly from the Greater New Orleans Area, which makes finding federal internship and employment opportunities an available and attractive proposition.

The Computer Science Department

The Computer Science Department offers Bachelor of Science ("BS"), and Master of Science ("MS") degrees in Computer Science ("CS"), and a Master in Cybersecurity and Operations. In addition, there are accelerated MS programs in both CS and Cybersecurity & Operations. The Computer Science Department, as previously mentioned, is the largest participant in the interdisciplinary Doctoral program in Engineering and Applied Science. The BS program has been continuously accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology ("ABET") since 1987; most recently the program was successfully reviewed in AY 2017-18.

UNO's Computer Science Department has developed its own information technology ("IT") infrastructure, becoming independent of the University's IT facilities. Currently, the Department hosts a dedicated data center with 60 servers, including a 38-node computer cluster, graphics processing unit ("GPU") and tensor processing unit ("TPU") computing facilities, and a large memory cluster containing 1 terabyte ("TB") of random-access memory ("RAM"). The data center supports desktop virtualization for over 200 desktops, server virtualization for department-wide use, and dedicated virtual machines to students for coursework and research. Over 126 TB of hybrid storage supports this virtualized infrastructure. Supporting infrastructure includes over 500 Cisco gigabit ports and 100 10Gbps ports, 40Gbps Ethernet and InfiniBand, 50-kilowatt ("KW") of uninterruptible power

supply ("UPS") capacity, and 50 KW of dedicated cooling. The department houses 4 instructional laboratories (open 24/7), 5 research laboratories, and two research-based centers. The 4 instructional laboratories can deliver remote instruction via live audio/video and can record the class. The facilities are staffed by a fulltime IT Director.

2. Duration of the Targeted Program(s) (Standard Time to Degree)

Standard Time to Degree

The standard time to degree for DENAS is three years for doctoral students entering the program with a master's degree. All full-time DENAS doctoral students are funded via Graduate Teaching Assistantships ("GTAs") or Graduate Research Assistantships ("GRAs").

3. Data Related to Student Success in the Targeted Program(s), including Retention and Average Time to Degree

Student Retention

Over the last decade, the one-year retention rate in the DENAS program was in the 75% to 100% range.

Average Time to Degree

DENAS average time to degree is 6.5 years (min 4.7 to max 7.5). Doctoral students can enter the program with either a Master's degree or a Bachelor degree.

Graduates of the Computer Science Department have gone on to excel locally (GE Digital, DXC, IBM, Geocent, Entergy, etc.), nationally (Google, Facebook, Netflix, Amazon, Intel, Motorola, AMD, General Dynamics, Lockheed Martin, Hartford, etc.) and internationally (Total Fina, EDF, DATUS, Fast Enterprises). Computer Science graduates of the DENAS doctoral program have built strong careers as scientists with the government (U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Naval Research Laboratory, Naval Meteorology & Oceanography Command, etc.) and in academia (American University, Roosevelt University, University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, Texas A&M University-Kingsville, etc.).

4. The Academic, Teaching, Research, and/or Service Environment(s) into which Scholarship Holders will be Integrated.

Academic, Research & Service Environment

The Computer Science Department has systematically invested in the development of cybersecurity and Environmental Informatics ("EI") expertise with the explicit goal of building strong applied research programs with a national reputation, and an across-the-board focus on hands-on learning and applied skills development.

At present, the department houses two Louisiana Board of Regents ("BoR") approved research centers, namely:

• Canizaro Livingston Gulf States Center for Environmental Informatics (Canizaro Livingston GulfSCEI, pronounced as "Canizaro Livingston Gulf Sea" or "Center") which was established in 2015. GulfSCEI focuses on a broad area of Environmental Informatics ("EI"). EI is an integrator of multiple scientific disciplines for the expressed purpose of serving environmental management needs. The Center applies environmental numerical modeling, machine learning and Artificial Intelligence ("AI") techniques and advanced geospatial information systems to develop smart environmental decision support systems for the sustainable management of marine fauna, risk mitigation, environmental monitoring, and geospatial intelligence. EI is of critical importance to the nation and to the State of Louisiana and is an area of major interest for many federal funding agencies. In addition to traditional research funding provided by the National Science Foundation, other agencies, such as the Department of Defense, United States Army Corps of Engineers, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration ("NOAA"), National Aeronautics and Space Administration ("NASA"), and Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries ("LDWF"), support applied research in specific EI areas of interest.

GulfSCEI provides special workforce training opportunities that are critical to the expansion of the local pool of highly qualified IT professionals in El. As an example of this, workshops have been held to train personnel from LDWF on GulfSCEI's sustainable harvests oyster modeling software platform. Custom software training has also been provided to scientists and professionals from the Naval Oceanographic Office ("NAVO") at Stennis Space Center in Mississippi. This is in line with the State of Louisiana's long-term effort to diversify the economy and attract and retain major technology companies.

In coordination with the Department of Computer Science, GulfSCEI serves as the coordination point for community outreach initiatives in the Greater New Orleans area, including educational programs for local middle and high schools. Weekly summer camps for middle and high school students are organized on a regular basis. GulfSCEI promotes societal benefits; indeed, GulfSCEI has a track record of producing solid software tools and mathematical models for the sustainable management of marine fauna, risk mitigation and environmental monitoring. GulfSCEI provides a development environment where, in collaboration with industry and government agencies, research ideas and prototypes are grown into real-world EI models and software tools to be used in daily applications. Since its establishment in 2015, GulfSCEI-affiliated faculty have secured major Research and Development ("R&D") grants/contracts with a grand total of over \$5.7M.

 The UNO Cyber Center ("UNOCC") was established to create advanced research and educational opportunities in cyber security for students at UNO's Computer Science Department. It serves as the focal point of cyber security R&D funding from federal

agencies and private industry at UNO and provides a modern environment for research exploration and hands-on learning. UNOCC also initiates and coordinates outreach initiatives to local educational institutions and industry, and builds practical tools to enhance real-world cyber security, operations, and forensic capabilities for society at large. The Center's capabilities play a major role in supporting the new Master of Science in Cyber Security and Operation, effective Fall 2020. UNOCC is currently a National Security Agency ("NSA")-designated Center of Academic Excellence ("CAE") in Research ("CAE-R"). In recent years, UNOCC has had sustained research funding via grants and contracts from NSA, National Science Foundation ("NSF") and other agencies. Computer Science students have been awarded Department of Defense ("DoD") Cybersecurity Scholarships which cover all educational expenses and provide scholarships of \$25-\$30K per year. The selected recipients participate in a summer internship program with their sponsoring DoD agencies (e.g., NSA and Naval Information Warfare Center), which they then join upon graduation. UNOCC has also been part of the Gen-Cyber program from the beginning and has organized five advanced summer camps for high-school educators.

Targeted Degree Program

The targeted recipients for the scholarship program will be those Computer Science doctoral students enrolled in the Engineering and Applied Sciences interdisciplinary doctoral program. In particular, doctoral students with EI focus (mostly Machine Learning and AI) or Cybersecurity concentration will be favored. DENAS includes two colleges (Engineering and Sciences) and eight departments, including Computer Science. Over the last decade, the program's enrollment was in the 60-100 range, including 15-20 students from Computer Science. The program has graduated at total of 168 since its establishment.

5. Expected Qualifications of Scholarship Recipients

Representatives from GulfSCEI and UNOCC will review the submitted applications to shortlist candidates for interview. Shortlisted applicants will be interviewed in person to select the final recipient(s) for the academic year. The selection of scholarship recipients from the eligible candidates will be based on multiple criteria. The primary selection criteria will be the strength of the recommendation letters, quality and depth of the applicant's statement of purpose, and the applicant's academic standing as reflected in their GPA (with a minimum of 3.5). Returning recipient(s) in excellent standing will be favored for renewal.

6. Expected Use of Endowment Proceeds

The totality of the endowment proceeds will be used towards scholarship(s) for qualified doctoral candidates.

7. Institutional Commitments to Scholarship Recipients, including Tuition Support

The Computer Science Department at UNO ensures that admitted full-time doctoral students are fully funded via Teaching Assistantships or Research Assistantships. This includes an annual stipend in the \$20K to \$24K range plus tuition waivers. The requested endowed scholarship will supplement the stipend, thus enabling the department to attract and retain high caliber doctoral students.

8. Anticipated Workforce Outcomes for Scholarship Recipients, including Possible fields of Employment, Average Salaries, and Known Demand

Workforce Needs

A major research focus of GulfSCEI is the application of Machine Learning and Artificial Intelligence ("ML" & "AI") to serve environment management needs, including risk mitigation, environment modeling, and geospatial intelligence. In Louisiana, the demand for experts in ML & AI is high. According to Glassdoor, a job-posting website, New Orleans, Baton Rouge, Lafayette, Shreveport, Monroe, Lake Charles, Alexandria, Metairie, Hammond, and Bossier City are the top cities in the state with a need for experts in ML and AI. Additionally, a review of the job listings in Glassdoor reveals that a large number of companies and federal agencies are currently seeking experts in ML & AI for positions in Louisiana including DXC, IBM Baton Rouge, GDIT, Radiance Technologies, Choices, Lucid, AWS, Sirius Computer Technologies, Danaher, Cynet Systems, Device Medical Products, Ochsner Health System, Acuity One LLC, Salient CRGT, U.S. Navy, Bennett Aerospace, Entergy and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers - New Orleans District. Nationwide, salaries in ML & AI range from \$86K to \$162K, with an average annual salary of \$122K. In the Greater New Orleans area, ML & AI salaries were estimated to be in the \$108K to \$152K range.

9. Relationship of Targeted Program(s) to Workforce Gaps and Targets Identified as Priorities for Louisiana

Cybersecurity, the research and instructional focus of UNOCC, is among the highest national priorities and is increasingly viewed as critical to both national defense and the daily operation of business and government, as well as to the normal functioning of civil society at large. A substantial number of critical infrastructure installations (such as ports, refineries, pipelines, and power plants) are situated in southern Louisiana. These are increasingly a common target of cyberattacks, with potentially major implications for the safety and well-being of Louisiana residents. The central purpose of UNOCC is to support in different forms the growth of a highly competent cybersecurity workforce.

According to the Louisiana Workforce Commission, information security analyst is among the top ten fastest growing occupations, with a projected statewide growth of 33.8% through 2024, and a median salary of \$82,643. For the New Orleans area, the corresponding median salary is \$91,486 while growth is projected at 46%; for the Baton Rouge area the figures are \$87,313 and 42%, respectively.

A review of the LAworks.net site shows that all jobs related to the Information Security and Cybersecurity industry are Four- or Five-Star jobs. A sample, including the range of salaries, is shown below:

He is the Director of UNO Cyber Center ("UNOCC"), which hosts the UNO cybersecurity program designated by NSA as a Center of Academic Excellence in Research and in Cyber Operations. Dr. Roussev has extensive organizational experience with over 30 executed grants and contracts (\$6.5M+) from NSF, NSA, DoD, and the Louisiana Board of Regents. His research interests are in the areas of cybersecurity, digital forensics, privacy, distributed systems, and cloud computing. He has over 50 peer-reviewed publications on security topics and is an Editor of the Journal of Digital Investigation. He is also the author of a recent book on Digital Forensics and is currently the Primary Investigator/Co-Primary Investigator on eight cybersecurity education grants from NSF and NSA.

Item I.4. University of Louisiana System's request for approval of payments made by nonprofit organizations to employees of the University of Louisiana System during Fiscal Year 2020 in accordance with provision of Louisiana Revised Statute (R.S.) 17:3390(F).

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Board of Supervisors for the University of Louisiana System is authorized by R.S. 17:3351(A)(10) to employ or approve the employment of and fix or approve the salaries of Board and university employees. Included in the definition of "salaries" is supplemental compensation and related benefits paid to or on behalf of an employee by an organization that is legally affiliated with the Board or its universities. "Supplemental compensation" does not include one-time payments for special awards, honorariums or stipends (e.g., awards for service recognition or to supplement an employee's classroom materials or projects), nor does the definition include payments for relocation expenses, which are more appropriately considered reimbursements of employee expenses.

R.S. 17:3390(F) provides that any request for payments of over one thousand dollars for any single transaction to, or on behalf of, or to reimburse the expense of a public employee of a public higher education institution or a public employee or officer of a management board of a public higher education institution by a nonprofit organization shall be approved in writing by the appropriate public higher education management board in accordance with written policies and procedures.

In accordance with PPM FB-IV.-6, we are requesting that Board of Supervisors for the University of Louisiana System approve the schedule of payments made by nonprofit organizations to university employees during the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2020. Individual campuses submit quarterly reports of payments that exceed one thousand dollars made by nonprofit organizations to university employees, which have been compiled into the attached schedule.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

Item I.7. University of Louisiana System's discussion of Fiscal Year 2020-21 second quarter financial reports and ongoing assurances.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Attached is a summary of the financial activities for the second quarter of the year ending June 30, 2021. This information was obtained from second quarter financial reports submitted by each university.

REVENUES:

The UL System reported year-to-date revenues through the second quarter as follows:

- 1. State General Fund Direct \$90 million or 50.1% of the budgeted amount.
- 2. Self-Generated Funds \$438.3 million or 65.4% of the budgeted amount and represents a decrease of 0.5% through the second quarter of fiscal 2020. The decrease resulted primarily from the COVID-19 shutdown.
- 3. Total revenues reported are \$528.4 million or 61.8% of the budgeted amount, an approximate 5.9% decrease compared to the second quarter of fiscal 2020. The decrease resulted primarily from decreased state appropriations from the prior year.

A comparison of fiscal 2021 to fiscal 2020 self-generated revenues for the second quarter follows:

1. State General Fund revenues decreased \$29,649,385, 24.8% compared to the second quarter of fiscal 2020. The decrease results from the shift in state appropriations in House Bill 307 that moved \$47,927,353 from fiscal 2021 to fiscal 2020.

State General Fund appropriations totaled \$222,912,528 and \$168,987,010 in fiscal years 2020 and 2021, respectively, resulting in a net difference in appropriations totaling \$53,934,518 before considering the effects of House Bill 307. When considering the effects of House Bill 307, the true decrease in State General Fund appropriations is \$6,007,165.

- 2. SELF funds are budgeted at \$13,568,726, a decrease of 14.3%, but the System may not receive 100% of those statutory dedicated funds. The decrease in the budgeted amount resulted from reductions from the shutdown.
- 3. Self-generated revenues from tuition and fees and other sources declined by \$2,034,336, or 0.5%, which in the current environment represents a relatively stable revenue base.
- 4. Total revenues increased by 5.9% \$32,924,416 compared to the second quarter of fiscal 2020 (\$29,649,385 of the decrease is in State General Fund appropriations).

EXPENSES:

Expenses by object for the UL System through the second quarter totaled \$451,212,807 as follows:

- 1. Personal services \$308.2 million, 50.0% of the available budget for this category
- 2. Operating services \$48.8 million, 71.0% of the available budget for this category
- 3. Professional services \$3.0 million, 39.4% of the available budget for this category
- 4. Other charges \$82.3 million, 59.3% of the available budget for this category
- 5. All other \$9.0 million, 38.1% of the available budget for this category

The majority of expenses by function for the UL System through the second quarter follow:

- 1. Instruction, research, and student-related \$326.3 million, 72.3% of total expenses
- 2. Institutional support \$66,776,343 million, 14.8% of total expenses
- 3. Operation and maintenance of plant \$46.0 million, 10.2% of total expenses

Expenses through the second quarter total \$451,212,807 – 52.8% of the total budget representing a decrease of \$14,564,917, or 3.1% over the second quarter of 2020. The decrease is primarily from decreases in salaries, other compensation, travel, supplies, other charges, and library acquisitions. Related benefits (pensions and other postemployment benefits – retiree healthcare) remained relatively unchanged.

HIGHLIGHTS OF AUXILIARY FINANCIAL REPORT – NON-ATHLETIC:

1. Year-to-date revenues and expenses for auxiliary operations, excluding athletics, total \$95.6 million and \$57.2 million, respectively, compared to \$135.3 million and \$70.4 million, respectively, through the second quarter of fiscal 2020. The decrease resulted primarily from the shutdown's effects on revenues and expenses for contracted services (e.g., dining and bookstore) and student housing.

- 2. Mandatory transfers out, excluding athletics, are expected to total \$19.9 million, a increase decrease of 27.3%.
- 3. Universities with projected current year operating deficits in excess of \$50,000 in specific auxiliary operations, before mandatory and non-mandatory transfers, are:
 - a. Grambling \$98,605 for the post office.
 - b. McNeese \$1,438,857 for the self-operated bookstore.
 - c. Northwestern \$1,137,994 for contracted services, \$223,610 for the student union, \$209,131 for the student health center, and \$702,545 for Card Services/ Card ID.
 - d. ULL \$441,997 for the self-operated bookstore, \$370,390 for the student union, \$654,100 for the student health center (before a non-mandatory transfer in for the same amount), \$231,000 for recreation/wellness (before a non-mandatory transfer in for the same amount), and \$368,839 for the print shop.
 - e. UNO \$809,035 for self-operated student housing and \$87,861 for the student union.

HIGHLIGHTS OF AUXILIARY FINANCIAL REPORT – ATHLETICS:

- 1. Total projected revenues (including transfers) are \$96,786,662, a decrease of \$18,508,963 from fiscal 2020, and total projected expenses totaling \$114,121,702, a decrease of \$2,855,131 from fiscal 2020. While most of the athletic expenses are fixed, revenues are expected to decline from the effects of the shutdown on ticket sales, conference distributions, and some game guarantees. The total projected change in the athletic fund balance after all transfers is a decrease of \$17,335,040.
- 2. The universities' projected current year surpluses/(deficits), after all transfers to and from auxiliary and operating funds, follow:
 - a. Grambling and Nicholls are currently projecting they will breakeven
 - b. LA Tech (\$1,760,000) deficit
 - c. McNeese (\$3,971,928) deficit
 - d. Northwestern (398,555) deficit
 - e. Southeastern (\$811,155) deficit
 - f. ULL (\$7,683,650) deficit
 - g. ULM (\$1,999,945) deficit
 - h. UNO (\$709,807) deficit

SPECIFIED RESTRICTED FUNDS:

Specified restricted fund balances as of December 31, 2020, totaled \$79,552,255, an increase of \$686,491, or 0.9%, from December 31, 2019. Overall, these changes represent a relatively stable mid-year position in these funds.
